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Staff Updates

We are delighted to announce that we have appointed seven new Paramedics, two Community Fundraisers, a Social Media Executive, a Regional Administrator and a Grants and Trusts Manager. Get to know them below.

The Paramedics are seconded from our partner Yorkshire Ambulance Service NHS Trust (YAS). They form part of our Critical Care Team, comprising Consultants in Emergency Medicine & Anaesthesia, and Paramedics who work as crew on our two YAA helicopters delivering the life-saving service 365 days a year to 5 million people across 4 million acres of Yorkshire.



Becky Knight (Wakefield)

Becky is from Wakefield and previously worked a dual role as an ambulance paramedic and lecturer practitioner in human and health sciences at the University of Huddersfield.

Becky said: "I have always been interested in helicopters and critical care. I wanted to become a HEMS Paramedic to challenge myself, help others and learn from the teams' experience and expertise."



Andy Watson (Leeds)

Andy lives in Leeds and has been a Paramedic for four years, progressing to Team Leader before joining Yorkshire Air Ambulance in 2022. Prior to working as a Paramedic, Andy was a personal trainer, a bodyguard and was in the military.

When asked why he wanted to work as a HEMS Paramedic, Andy said: "HEMS is the best job within the ambulance service and it's a job most paramedics aspire to."



Terri-Ann Lonie (Harrogate)

Terri-Ann became a Paramedic in 2017, initially based out of Keighley, then Pateley Bridge and finally Harrogate. She then completed a secondment at HART, Yorkshire's Hazardous Area Response Team before joining Yorkshire Air Ambulance in 2022.

When asked why she wanted to join YAA, Terri-Ann said: "I wanted to work with the most amazing clinicians, Paramedics and Pilots. The pre-hospital care they give and the speed that they can fly a patient to the hospital is incredible."

Sam lives in Bridlington. He began his career working in the Coast Guard Search and Rescue Team for nine years and joined the ambulance service in 2016. He worked his way up to Team Leader before joining the Charity.

"I wanted to work for Yorkshire Air Ambulance because it's the best air ambulance in the country and brings the very best care to critically ill patients and working in the fantastic small Critical Care Team will allow me to do this", said Sam.



Lindsey Newey (Sheffield)

Lindsey lives in Sheffield. She studied to become a Paramedic at Coventry University and then went on to work in Bristol for Southwestern Ambulance Service. She then moved to Yorkshire Ambulance Service before joining YAA.

Pedal for Pounds

Bank Holiday Stats

Bank holidays are often the busiest times for all emergency services, as more people take to the roads and take part in leisure activities.



148

Over the last four years, the Charity has responded to 148 incidents on UK bank holidays across Easter, Spring Bank and Christmas. There has been almost a 10% increase in incidents since 2018.



In 2018, we responded to 33 incidents, followed by 40 in 2019 and 41 in 2020. Bank Holiday incidents dipped slightly to 34 in 2021.



2020

Despite being amid a pandemic and one bank holiday weekend under lockdown rules, 2020 was the busiest year between 2018 and 2021 for bank holiday call-outs.



The most common bank holiday incidents are road traffic collisions and motorcycle incidents, of which within the last four years there have been 18, followed closely by falls and equestrian incidents. In 2020, the most common incident type was cycling.



Men were involved in nearly three times more incidents than women (52 vs 19) and the most common patient ages were between 40 – 65 years old.

This Easter saw the Charity respond to 21 incidents across the region, including serious incidents across some of Yorkshire's motorways.




Paul Holmes, Acting Clinical Operations Manager said: "Bank holidays are a busy time not only for ourselves, but many emergency services as more people are out and about across the UK enjoying themselves and not always thinking about the necessary precautions. While we want people to enjoy their summer, we would also like to urge everyone to remain safe and be aware of common hazards that these busy periods may bring."

What do these people have in common?

Every year, YAA treats a diverse mix of patients. In 2021 alone, we responded to 1,712 incidents, and over the last 20 years, we have flown more than 8,300 patients to major trauma centres across the region, often for life-saving treatment.

Here are just a small example of people YAA has helped over the years:




Kayanna Nicol

On 10th April 2019, Kayanna Nicol from Doncaster, who was seven at the time, accidentally walked into the pathway of an oncoming vehicle. The back wheel of the car caught her leg and split it from side to side causing massive trauma. Kayanna was flown to Sheffield Children's Hospital, where she was rushed into a five-hour surgery to save her leg. Kayanna's father Keith, said: "She received excellent attention and the treatment that Kayanna received was second to none. I couldn't fault anyone; they are all brilliant people".




Caroline Shepherd

Caroline Shepherd from Helmsley, North Yorkshire, was out on her horse at Lockton near Pickering in 2018 when she suddenly collapsed and fell from it. Caroline was airlifted to James Cook University Hospital, where brain scans revealed that she had suffered from a subarachnoid haemorrhage. Doctors told her that she was lucky to be alive as she had technically died at the scene before being resuscitated. Caroline is now a registered volunteer for Yorkshire Air Ambulance. "I owe them my life and I cannot thank them enough for everything they have done", she said.



Anthony Burman

Anthony Burman was involved in a serious motorcycle racing incident at Elvington race track near York in 2009. He said: "Without the Yorkshire Air Ambulance I would not be where I am today, you just never know when you or your family may need these heroes"



Professor Ben Von Hout

Professor Ben von Hout suffered a near-fatal cardiac arrest in York in May 2019. Speaking of his incident, Ben said: "The faster you are at the hospital, the better the results are and of course going in the helicopter decreases the time between symptoms and having a stent placed. I can only be thankful to everyone doing such a good job. I can't believe how lucky I am."



Robert Wood

Robert Wood was doing some maintenance work on the 106-year-old bells at Middleham Parish Church in Wensleydale, when he slipped and fell several feet onto part of the mechanism, impaling his chin on a metal peg. We flew Robert to James Cook University Hospital in Middlesbrough for an urgent four-hour operation on his jaw. "The land and the air ambulance were there very quickly, and I was just so grateful to be flown to the hospital within minutes. They saved me from what would have been a long and painful journey of over an hour on winding roads", said Robert.



Imran Choudhry

Imran Choudhry from Oldham was featured in a one-hour special episode 'Critical Hour' of the award-winning television show, Helicopter ER. His accident, which saw him fall around 100ft down a steep ravine from the Trinnacle Point at Saddleworth Moor, was one of YAA's most complex rescues in our 22 years of operations. He said: "They are my angels who saved me. I'm so grateful for their help. It was a very challenging rescue and it's amazing what they did to save me."



Hayley Delaney

Hayley Delaney from Bradford was only five weeks away from completing her midwifery course when she was involved in a serious road traffic collision when a car ran a red light at a crossroads near Cleckheaton back in 2013. She was left with significant brain injuries and had to learn to walk again. "The air ambulance are my angels in the sky. I wouldn't be here without them. They have saved my life and changed my life, and they will always hold a special place in my heart", said Hayley.



Nigel Atkinson

On the 26th of September 2019, Nigel Atkinson was riding his motorcycle on the M18 motorway near Thorne. As he was passing an articulated goods vehicle, the prop shaft from that wagon flew off into the front wheel of his bike resulting in Nigel coming off his bike at 70 mph causing him serious injury. A passer-by named Matthew, who was driving his van, positioned his vehicle to protect Nigel as he was catapulted through the air, so no further damage came to him on the busy motorway and then started immediate CPR until the emergency services arrived. We dispatched our helicopter and Nigel was flown to the hospital for further treatment. "I'm eternally grateful to YAA and Matthew's heroic efforts", said Nigel.

Abby Barmby, Director of Marketing and Communications added: "These are just a few of the remarkable people we have been able to help and save over our 22 years of operations. All of them highlight the vital work we do, and how our crews help to save lives. We are so grateful to each

of them for allowing us to share their story and help us educate people about the work our charity does. As an independent charity which receives no direct government funding, we rely solely on charitable donations so having previous patients share their stories does help us spread the word."

North Yorkshire Volunteer



West Yorkshire Volunteers




Husband and wife team, Mike and Elaine volunteer in the West region and also provide vital administrative support in YAA's Cayley House office.

West Yorkshire Volunteer



Meet our **new** *Grants & Trusts* Manager



Marianne Haworth

In May 2022, Marianne Haworth was appointed our new Grants and Trusts Manager. Marianne is responsible for applying to Grants and Trusts organisations on behalf of the Charity and sourcing opportunities. We caught up with Marianne to learn all about her career history and what she aims to bring to the Charity.

Career history

"I was a full-time lawyer practising employment as an employment solicitor for six years. I then took some time off when I had my children before working with a Parish Council giving them legal and financial advice. That's how I got into grant funding as I was applying for grants on behalf of the Parish Council. I then moved on to do grant funding for a school academy which had 13 primary schools, before leaving there to join YAA.

Why did you want to work for YAA?

I have always lived in Yorkshire and have been drawn to the Charity. I wanted to use the skills that I have acquired to be part of a team that is doing work for such a good cause.

What are you looking to bring to your role?

To increase contacts with a wider reach of charitable trusts and foundations. To get out there beyond Yorkshire, but also celebrate and nurture our Yorkshire relationships.

Being able to apply to Grants and Trusts organisations for funding is an integral part of YAA, and contributes heavily to our vital running costs. They help us secure funding for specialist equipment, training support and facilities for our crew to deliver the very best patient care.

What are the current challenges to grant funding?

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic and economic instability, competition for grant funding has been fierce, with some business organisations prioritising grant funding over seeking loans or financing that needed to be repaid. Trends and themes, such as climate change and food poverty are also continually changing meaning some causes lose out temporarily.

What kind of organisations give grant funding to charities?

Any individual, business, group or other charity can establish their foundation or charitable trust with powers to offer grants for general or specific charitable purposes. Trust funding can be granted for general operational costs or restricted for a specific initiative or project. At Yorkshire Air Ambulance we are extremely grateful to the donors who have supported us, and continue to do so, via grants.

What do you like doing in your spare time?

I like running, going to exercise classes and mountain biking when I can. I have three children, twins and an elder child.

Interesting fact

Marianne's family like spending a lot of time outdoors and they have a holiday booked on a small island with no electricity later this year.

FAQs

We caught up with our Acting Clinical Operations Manager Paul Holmes to answer some of your most frequently asked questions.



What do you get up to in between calls?

It depends. When we're at the unit, a lot of people have different things to do. We have audits, training to do and occasionally have people doing degrees, master's degrees and research papers in the quieter areas of the base. Sometimes people just want to have a coffee and biscuit and watch television for a bit to unwind.

How do you keep fit?

We eat a lot of chocolates and cake at the base, so this gives us the motivation to go work out! We have a wellbeing suite here where we have running and cycling machines, as well as weights. Sometimes people will go out for a run or cycle before or after their shifts. We also have to do an annual fitness test, so we have to ensure we don't eat too many sweet treats.

How do you cope with traumatic incidents?

A lot of jobs we go to could lend themselves to being classed as traumatic due to the nature of the jobs we do. We have mental health first aiders on base and TRIM (Trauma Risk Management) practitioners so we can identify the changes in people's behaviours and work out what might be underlying and signpost them accordingly. Because we work so closely with each other, we do have a rapport where we can just have a chat and work out what we can improve and what learnings can come from traumatic incidents.

How does it feel being on television?

For me, initially, it was quite nerve-racking. When we treat a patient, we have an idea in our minds but trying to vocalise that plan to someone who is putting a camera in your face is quite daunting. But you get used to it and the guys and girls from Air TV are so embedded in the team now that enables us to almost forget that they are there. It is interesting when you are recognised down the street or at a PR event. My little girl enjoys seeing me on TV too!

What is your average call-out length?

The average call-out length depends on the type of job we go to. If we respond to an incident in a rural area, we have to lift from the base and then find somewhere to land and if it isn't close to the patient, we then have to try to either get a lift or walk to the incident. It's around one hour and 15 minutes per incident, but again it is dependent on the resources required and if we are re-tasked to another job afterwards.

How do you become a HEMS Paramedic?

The process to become a HEMS Paramedic is quite complex. We have to, first of all, be employed by the ambulance service (YAS). So you need to do all of your qualifications, then you have to become registered with The Healthcare Professions Council which regulates the Paramedic profession by which point then you need three to five years experience on the road post qualification. A lot of people have the ambition to come to the unit, but it's a huge learning curve for experienced Paramedics, never mind newly qualified Paramedics. By applying for a job, you then have to undergo an assessment including a fitness test and a few scenarios, a written paper and then all the scores are added up to decipher who is eligible to come for an interview.




